Fraud ringleader is convicted

City to ask state to cover half of \$769M for the X, **RiverCentre**, Roy Wilkins

Calling the home of the Minnesota Wild vital to the future of its downtown, the city of St. Paul will ask state lawmakers to cover half the cost of what's being pitched as

a \$769 million, top-to-bottom ren-ovation of the Xcel Energy Center and St. Paul RiverCentre, with the hockey team covering 30% and St. Paul splitting the remaining 20% of the price with Ramsey County.

The proposed overhaul goes beyond sprucing up the 25-year-old, 18,000-seat multi-purpose arena for concerts and hockey fans. It includes a \$150 million upgrade to the Roy Wilkins Auditorium and \$50 million in improvements to the RiverCentre convention facility, though the bulk of the spending -\$569 million – would go to the X.

St. Paul Mayor Melvin Carter and Wild owner Craig Leipold will unveil their proposal at the House Capital Investment Committee on Thursday and to the Senate next Tuesday.

The agency had been running an undercover operation targeting underage commercial sex and had posted an online advertisement to which Eichorn, 40, responded on March 11, the U.S. Attorney's Office alleges. The advertisement featured images of a person who claimed to be 18.

But in messages and voice chats over several days, the undercover officer repeatedly said she was not 18, but 17 years old. Eichorn continued asking about pricing for various sex acts and arranged to meet in person, according to the charge.

In messages included in the federal criminal complaint, Eichorn allegedly asked the undercover officer about how much it would cost for a "Qv" or quick visit, or a "half hour," and whether an "outcall" visit would be possible. He also asked how much extra it would cost to not use a condom.



The buses on the Gold Line are more than 60 feet long and bend in the middle. They have wider aisles, which allow passengers in wheelchairs to self-secure, and they feature all-door boarding.

There are 16 stations on the Gold Line, and each one features on-demand heat, real-time departure signs, security cameras and emergency telephones, said Adam Harrington, director of service development for Metro Transit.

The stations and buses are ADA accessible and also feature bicycle racks and trash and recycling cans.



The cost for Gold Line rides is the same as light rail and local buses, which is \$2 for ages 13 to 64 and \$1 for those who qualify for reduced fares (adults over 64, youth under 13, Medicare card holders and people with disabilities). All-day passes cost \$4 for ages 13 to 64 and \$2 for those who qualify for reduced fare.
